

Forty-six pieces of work are on display in a variety of mediums - oil, acrylic, and watercolour paintings, photography, collage, and mixed medium.





Artist's Journey: Tricia Edgar - Echoes of the Past



A Retreat into the Past

Tricia Edgar recently embarked on a deeply personal artistic retreat at an 1800s blacksmith shop in Grimsby, Ontario—a place built by her greatgreat-great-grandfather, Allan Nixon, around 1798-1800. This historic "Stone Shop" setting has inspired her to create a new series of mixed-media pieces, blending heritage, storytelling, and emotion.

The shop, filled with War of 1812 artifacts and area antiques, has been lovingly preserved by its current owners. Tricia found the fireplace to be the most captivating element, easily imagining how this became a gathering spot for friends and shelter for those who needed it during the harsh conditions of 200+ years ago.

A Story Worth Telling



From Sketch to Canvas

During her stay, Tricia documented the textures, colors, and artifacts of this historic site through detailed sketches and plans for future paintings. She also worked on her family tree, connecting deeper with her ancestral roots. Each piece she's creating carries echoes of the past, bringing forgotten narratives into the present.

What makes this retreat even more fascinating is learning how her ancestors, along with other area settlers, teamed together as allies with the Mohawks of The Six Nations. As noted in online documentation, Indigenous leaders mentioned in their memoirs that they spent time at the Stone Shop during the War of 1812, sleeping in front of the same fireplace Tricia found so captivating. These included John Brant, Joseph Brant's son, and John Smoke Johnson, who was a Mohawk Warrior.



Tricia shares, "It was a surreal experience to work in a place where my ancestors lived and created. I felt a strong connection to the history embedded in every wall and artifact."

Her brave adventure was tested when, due to a snowstorm, her husband couldn't make it the first night and she needed to stay alone. "I'd never stayed alone at night in such a historic place before," Tricia admits, "but I'm proud to say anxiety did not prevail and there were no ghosts! This little historic place has a truly positive vibe, and I can't wait to return."

Moumita is a self-taught artist and art teacher based out of Kitchener-Waterloo. Nature plays the lead role in her work, captured through the spontaneous flow of watercolors or the vibrant brush strokes of acrylics or the soft subtleness of pastels. She likes to take inspiration from the colours and moods of nature which changes like the myriad shades of human emotions. She has been teaching art courses in a variety of media at the Button Factory Arts, Homer Watson House & Gallery and with the City of Waterloo.

Moumita enjoys the thrill of capturing nature en plein air as well as painting live and has won several live art competitions like the ArtBattle and The Brush Off. She is also enthralled by the impact and joy of creating murals in public spaces and has created some largescale murals in the Waterloo region.

In 2020, Moumita won the gold award for the Best Local Visual Artist category for the Waterloo Region Records Reader's Choice Awards. She has been a regular winner of the live art competition The Brush Off at The Museum in Kitchener in 2019, 2023, 2024, 2025 as well as ArtBattle live competitions in various cities as well as at the Nationals. Her art has been exhibited and awarded at several juried exhibitions across Ontario and she has won many awards.

Instruction at the Haliburton School of Art, Albert Casson's School of Art, Loyalist Art School, and classes with a variety of local artists have inspired and guided her skill development. She is an online attendee at Art Live conferences.

As a current member of KWSA (Kitchener Waterloo Society of Artists) and COAA (Central Ontario Artists Association), she is enjoying the opportunities to meet with fellow artists and continue with learning opportunities.

Her art has been displayed in the Maple Hollow Studio north of Kingston, the Link Gallery in Waterloo, the Minto Art Gallery in Harriston, and Frames by Verne in Kitchener. She has participated in the juried Cambridge Centre for the Arts show (2022) and the Mary Allen Studio Tour (2023, 2024). Most recently, she enjoyed illustrating a children's book, and while wildlife and birds have been her forte, she always enjoys the call for beloved pet portraits. Artist Statement

Deb uses line, negative space, form, and color as her guides to representing chosen topics. Details capture her eye, and she loves the challenge of exploring elusive details beyond the obvious. As she progresses with her work, she enjoys surprising herself and viewers with the unexpected - be it color or line. She works primarily with pastels, though also enjoys mixed media, i.e., watercolors, colored pencil, and pen and ink. A favorite technique is eraser work, then building with shadows and highlights. Feathers and fur are wonderful venues for this work. And, of course, detailing eyes to bring life to her critters always brings excitement to her work. Wildlife, birds, and young animals tend to be her main subjects of interest, but she takes pleasure in working from a wide range of topics.

Marie Voisin, the late Ernie Ritz (former Mayor of New Hamburg), and Kristen Hahn, all passionate historians, have undertaken a labor of love that has morphed into a 5-volume set of books that catalogue the historic buildings of New Hamburg and the people who lived and currently live in them.

The five-volume covers have been illustrated by Barbara McLeod with beautiful renderings of heritage homes. On this occasion, the three historians were honored to receive The Architectural Conservancy Ontario Stephen A. Otto Award for research and documentation. Barbara is honored to have played a role in this endeavor.

Historic Buildings of New Hamburg and the People Who Lived in Them will be published soon.

This project represents an important intersection of art and historical preservation, showcasing how artists can contribute to maintaining our cultural heritage for future generations.




