### ART ADVENTURE TO THE MCMICHAEL CANADIAN ART COLLECTION. KLEINBURG

On Wednesday, April 23rd, six COAA members embarked on a delightful art excursion to the renowned McMichael Art Gallery in Kleinburg. Nancy Taves, Janice Grey, Monica MacInnis, EvaNali Spacek, Debbie Eckmeier, and Barb McLeod took advantage of the organization's six complimentary gallery passes and generous lunch credit, an opportunity that generated enthusiastic response from the membership.

The day began with Janice skillfully navigating the scenic backroads as their designated driver, creating a leisurely and enjoyable journey to their destination. The group coordinated to meet Monica and EvaNali directly at the gallery, ensuring everyone could participate in this cultural adventure.

Upon arrival, the members guickly realized the impressive scope of the McMichael's collection would require strategic planning to fully appreciate. The vast array of paintings and sculptures on display prompted them to divide their visit into two segments, with a well-deserved lunch break at The Cabin, the gallery's conveniently located restaurant within the main building. This pause proved to be more than just a meal - it became a wonderful opportunity for the group to connect on a personal level, sharing stories and getting to know each other better while making excellent use of their lunch credit. The menu offerings received enthusiastic praise from all participants.

During their exploration, the group discovered that the famous Group of Seven exhibit operates as a traveling show, with the precious artworks requiring extended periods of storage in complete darkness to preserve their integrity. While disappointed to miss seeing many of these iconic Canadian paintings, the members appreciated understanding the careful conservation measures necessary to protect these national treasures for future generations. The gallery's well-stocked gift shop provided additional browsing opportunities, offering various items that captured the visitors' interest.

A particularly exciting highlight of their visit was the Annual Kleinburg En Plein Air finalists' exhibition, which showcased the work of artists who participate in this prestigious outdoor painting competition. Each year, talented artists create plein air pieces painted either on the McMichael property grounds or on the nearby Humber River lands.

The competition runs from July through October, attracting artists who embrace the challenge of capturing the natural beauty of the area.

The group took special pride in discovering that their own Nancy Taves, who serves as COAA's Membership Chair, had achieved the honor of being selected as a finalist in this year's competition.





Her painting, titled 'Cabin Fever,' was displayed prominently within the gallery, representing both her artistic talent and the quality of work produced by COAA members. The upcoming Reception, Awards, and Close of the Show, scheduled for July 27th from 1:00 pm to 2:30 pm, presents an excellent opportunity for fellow members to support Nancy and view the complete exhibition.

The entire experience proved to be thoroughly enjoyable and enriching for all participants. While many COAA members have likely visited the McMichael Collection at various times over the years, the ever-changing nature of the exhibits ensures that each visit offers something new and inspiring. The group encourages other members to consider planning their own excursions to Kleinburg, confident that the experience will exceed expectations and provide both artistic inspiration and enjoyable fellowship.

This successful outing demonstrates the value of COAA's group activities, combining cultural enrichment with the opportunity for members to strengthen their connections with fellow artists. Marion Anderson - Move Fast and Break Things

"This piece vibrates with movement, letting the eye dance along to the pattern created by repeat shapes, solidary daubs, a restrained use of texture, used to intrigue and anchor but not overwhelm. A landscape that lets you dream your way deeply into its centre. Just enough balance of representational and abstract to imagine and recognise both."

### Janice Hindley - Ghost In The Machine

"Peering into the past through weathered glass reflecting the present, this photo is full of story, with each layer a chapter. The palette is balanced beautifully with such an interesting relationship between the bottom rusty red and upper middle spring green."

### Artist SpotLight: Mary Flatt's Soaring Success

Local artist Mary Flatt has reason to celebrate this spring, as her captivating osprey painting has been selected for the prestigious Annual Pastel Artists of Canada gallery show. The juried exhibition, taking place in May at the Neilson Creative Arts Centre in Etobicoke, represents a significant milestone in Flatt's artistic journey.

Her accepted piece, "Lovers Key Sentinels," demonstrates the artist's remarkable ability to capture both the fierce intensity and tender beauty of these magnificent birds of prey. Flatt's vision centers on a pair of ospreys perched high in their stick nest, their piercing gaze surveying the world below with the focused determination of master hunters. The Artist's Vision

In her artist statement, Flatt reveals the thoughtful balance she sought to achieve in this compelling work. She masterfully contrasts the razor-sharp precision of the birds' hunting eyes and bright sunlight against the softer, more contemplative elements of shadowed feathers and the gentle blur of tangled branches. The neutral tones of the nest provide a perfect counterpoint to the vibrant blue sky, creating a composition that feels both dramatic and harmonious.

"The sharp beaks and sturdy legs display their effective weapons," Flatt notes, yet there's something deeply moving about how she invites viewers to connect with these skilled fishers. Her technique reveals an intimate understanding of her subjects - the way light catches on a feather, the intensity of a predator's stare, the weathered texture of a nest built high above the beach.

#### A Moment of Recognition

This juried selection represents more than just professional recognition; it's validation of Flatt's unique ability to translate the raw power and beauty of wildlife into art that resonates with viewers on an emotional level. Her pastel work captures not just the physical characteristics of these remarkable birds, but their essence – their role as sentinels watching over their domain.

The opportunity to showcase her work alongside other distinguished pastel artists across Canada speaks to the quality and impact of Flatt's artistic vision. As her "Lovers Key Sentinels" takes its place in the gallery, visitors will have the chance to experience her remarkable ability to bridge the gap between observer and subject, inviting them into a moment of connection with the natural world. For Flatt, this achievement marks another step in her continuing journey as an artist who finds inspiration in the wild beauty that surrounds us, transforming fleeting moments into lasting works of art that speak to the heart.

These pages whisper stories—of people who stayed up late designing by hand, who gathered for art shows with homemade cookies and shared rides, who believed that art wasn't just a practice—it was a way of life.

## The Hidden Lessons of Art – A Journey Through Teaching and Technique -- Vaughn Gillson

In the early days of her artistic career, this COAA member was deeply immersed in the world of art education—teaching not just from a studio, but across various venues around the Greater Toronto Area. For her, sharing knowledge wasn't just about technique. It became a reflective journey—one that made her question the very purpose of art and its untapped potential in broader learning.

She firmly believes that art should hold a foundational place in school curriculums, taught in a structured and meaningful way. This belief inspired the creation of a series of instructional guides for elementary school teachers, offering not just lesson support but insight into core art concepts and principles. This journey eventually evolved into the making of a heartfelt video—a 20-minute visual exploration that weaves her own work, training, and teaching materials into one story. The video (available here: <a href="https://youtu.be/51LERGW6w80">https://youtu.be/51LERGW6w80</a>) captures more than just artistic technique; it highlights how art-making quietly nurtures skills like abstract thinking, organization, and an understanding of parts and wholes.

Though modest about the video—calling it "a bit rambling" with editing experiments along the way—what shines through is sincerity. A love for teaching, a commitment to creativity, and a belief that behind every brushstroke lies a lesson not just in art, but in life.









## From Watercolours to Whimsy – Linda Kemp's Ongoing Creative Evolution

While going through COAA's archives, we came across a familiar name that sparked instant warmth—Linda Kemp. Her early contributions helped shape the foundation of our community, and we're delighted to share where her journey has taken her today. Linda continues to paint with a joyful spirit, though these days, it's quirky animals and birds that leap from her imagination onto acrylic panels. Alongside her visual art, she's found delight in writing whimsical poems and stories to accompany her characters—merging word and image in playful, unexpected ways.

Her passion for teaching is still alive, as is her interest in video-based learning. Though her subject matter has evolved, her artistic inquiry remains rooted in the search for simplicity—exploring how shapes and colours interact, and uncovering the hidden mechanics behind each composition.

Linda's advice for emerging artists is simple, yet powerful:

"Create for yourself with a curious mind."

Learn the basics well, she says—but don't be afraid to get messy, to experiment, to explore what lies beyond the rules.

## Still Painting Through the Storms: Celebrating Doug's Artistic Spirit

In every community, there are a few rare souls who not only create beautiful art—but also live a life that becomes art in itself. Doug is one of them.

His hands have shaped the Ontario art community for years, nurturing creativity through countless in-person workshops and mentoring artists with such generous heart. When the world shifted during the pandemic, he didn't just adapt—he flourished, opening his home studio to host 155 virtual watercolour workshops, turning isolation into connection and uncertainty into inspiration.

Then December 2023 brought an unexpected storm. A stroke tested his strength, his balance, the very hands that have created so much beauty. But here's what moves us most: he never stopped painting. Week after week, with quiet determination and boundless courage, he continues creating.

Doug calls art his "saviour." And through his healing, he's given back—gifting his caregivers watercolour pieces and even offering free in-person demos to thank those who stood by him.

His story is a powerful reminder that art doesn't stop when life gets hard—sometimes, that's when it matters most. To young and emerging artists, Doug's journey teaches us that creativity is more than talent—it's resilience, gratitude, and a deep love for sharing beauty, no matter the odds.
